Environmental documentary 'Plastic Britain'

This feature length documentary has been completed, after four years filming, and its World Premiere is this evening (Sunday 8 November 2020) at the 27th SunCine Environmental Film Festival in Barcelona. During the Festival (4-12 Nov) the film entries will be viewable only in Spain. Awards will be presented once the festival concludes. The entry 'Plastic Britain' is a production by Outpost Pictures (http://www.outpost-pictures.com/) from the English south coast.

The two film makers Poppy Chandler and Mike Wafer came to visit us at the Dove Marine Laboratory (Newcastle University at Cullercoats) in early October 2018 to record an interview and film a fulmar necropsy thanks to the work of our beached bird group. Poppy said that our work '... is a big part of the seabird section in the film'.

The film has been nominated for the prestigious 'Golden Sun - Best Documentary' award and its trailer can be seen here: https://youtu.be/H6Id1y0vvqI It is hoped that the film will be shown in the UK in the future.
