We are building partnerships with organisations across the North East, reaching more people and giving more opportunities to connect with nature. We launched 'How to be a Young North East Naturalist,' engaging with 200 children with their local nature.

Celebrating Nature Conservation and Citizen Science

Thanks to the support of NHSN members, we reached more people than ever before to learn about and protect North East Nature.

Citizen Science

NHSN's citizen science programme went from strength to strength in 2021-22. The North East Bee Hunt and North East Ladybird Spot returned and achieved totals of 2,851 and 2,349 records, by 126 and 117 participants respectively. A new project, Discovering North East Orchids, launched in spring 2022. This proved successful with 1,604 records shared from 92 participants. Citizen science projects will return next year, and you can get involved to make a difference for local nature.

- 6,804 records submitted
- 335 citizen scientists
- 293 people attended citizen science events

Specialist Groups

Our Specialist Groups have continued a wide and varied programmes of events, talks and activities. Approximately 68 events, 45 talks and 22 natural history education courses took place.

Earth Sciences

NHSN's Earth Sciences Specialist Group organised several successful courses, including an exciting new course on oceanography. Several field trips took geologists to a host of interesting sites across the North East, including Howick and Winlaton.

Botany

NHSN's Botany Specialist Group launched NHSN's first botanical citizen science project, Discovering North East Orchids. Several events were held to coincide with the Botanical Society of Britain and Ireland (BSBI) New Year Plant Hunt. Fifteen field trips took place, and NHSN's botany Facebook group grew to 300 people.

Invertebrates

The Bee Hunt and Ladybird Spot returned this year and NHSN's Invertebrate Specialist Group led ten invertebrate field trips. Four special online workshops on bees and ladybirds were held and a new invertebrate Facebook group encourages learning and recording.

Supporting Regional Conservation

The Dickinson Memorial Fund supported Nature Guides to publish *The Plants of Holy Island* and Paul Miskin of Arts and Biodiversity Celebration to showcase high profile speakers.

NHSN is building collaborations, leading walks with the Environmental Records Information Centre North East and students from Newcastle University. NHSN botanists participated in a bioblitz at the Hepple Estate in Northumberland and several collaborative events were held to support citizen science with Urban Green Newcastle and the BSBI.









Gosforth Nature Reserve

With open days returning and an abundance of wildlife recorded, it's been an eventful year for Gosforth Nature Reserve.

Over 25 Volunteer Rangers have been welcoming visitors and encouraging wildlife sightings. 20 Conservation Volunteers carry out habitat management and repairs across the reserve, managing woodland and reedbeds, repairing fencing and relocating the Pearce Hide.

May 2022 saw the official opening of the new Field Studies Room, welcoming more school and community groups. Thanks to committed volunteers who created access ramps and an outdoor learning space including a raised pond.

20 enthusiastic volunteer Education Rangers created a new and exciting educational programme, enabling school visits to return.

Open days returned post pandemic with 350 visitors discovering the reserve, their learning and enjoyment increased by the enthusiasm and knowledge of volunteers and partner organisations. A pollinator bioblitz further encouraged sightings and identification of invertebrates.

Persimmon Homes withdrew their planning application to build houses opposite the reserve on land designated for business use. Thank you to the individuals and groups who submitted 5,815 objections to North Tyneside Council.

A Great Year for Wildlife

Four-spotted Cha

You recorded 1,715 sightings at Gosforth Nature Reserve of 526 species. Highlights include new ladybird records for the North East, Barn Owl chicks, breeding Otter and a nationally rare lichen.

Invertebrate Species at Gosforth Nature Reserve

- 365 moths
- 30 hoverflies
- 25 bees
- 20 butterflies
- 17 dragonflies and damselflies
- 17 ladybirds

Expanding our Digital Horizons

NHSN developed more digital opportunities as for many, digital events were still preferred following the covid pandemic. New material has been made available through our website and social media. Our natural history digital talks during the winter were enhanced by the 1829 Talks, a series of 15-minute talks showcasing the work of early-career researchers.

Other highlights include:

- YouTube channel film views totalling 28,000 in the year
- 13,700 followers on social media
- · 52 videos released online

Inspiring Young Naturalists


In line with member's aspirations and local need, our work supporting young naturalists has increased this year. Thanks to your support, we are inspiring young people about North East nature.

Highlights include:

- Distributing 660 nature activity bags to young people who have few opportunities to connect with nature, thanks to donors of our Lantern Fund.
- Launching 'How to be a Young North East naturalist,' engaging 200 children, from five primary schools.
- Connecting local young people with nature outside of curriculum hours through 'Your Plan A' for North East Nature project.
- Welcoming 585 young people to Gosforth Nature Reserve.
- Increasing student activities by working with the Newcastle University Student Union and supported four student research projects.


