Recording Regional Wildlife

From the Tees to the Tweed, your sightings are increasing our understanding of North East nature

This year, over 328 of you shared your sightings of local wildlife, in doing so, providing important information to help project nature.


Together, you shared over 4,000 sightings of bees, ladybirds and orchids across the North East and at Gosforth Nature Reserve, captured over 1,700 sightings of everything from rare flowers to fish – including Gosforth Nature Reserve's first Eel in many years!

In urban Tyneside, over 200 of you shared the nature you noticed close to home as part of Gosforth's Wild Web, helping show the importance of the city's urban nature corridors, and from Holy Island to Upper Teesdale, many of you joined surveys and events bringing nature closer than ever before.

Your support also enabled NHSN's Dickinson Memorial Fund to support the Bedlington and District Red Squirrel Group, herbarium volunteers to repackage valuable specimens and bird hide improvements.

I have really enjoyed contributing to NHSN's Gosforth's Wild Web project. Spending time outdoors, slowing down and really noticing nature around me has increased my feeling of nature connectedness and improved my overall physical and mental wellbeing. It's been a fun introduction to wildlife recording, helped improve my identification skills and given me confidence to share my observations with others.

Despite the wider challenges facing nature, your support ensured Gosforth Nature Reserve thrived in 2024, its centenary year!



This year's centenary celebration was marked with exciting events and a special film watched by over 1,000 people. Volunteer Education Rangers inspired 824 school children about local nature and 299 attended the reserve's annual open day.

Volunteer Rangers warmly welcomed visitors and Conservation Volunteers carried out important works including accessible footpaths, seating and habitat improvements. More community groups visited too with the Field Studies Room hosting team away days and art courses and identification sessions.

This year proved to be a good one for wildlife too with favourites such as Otter, Kingfisher and Barn Owl delighting visitors, plus the first Marsh Tit spotted in several decades.

Wildlife monitoring continued with student research projects on beetles, footfall and otters. Surveys were carried out with partners including the Environment Agency, Newcastle University and Tyne Rivers Trust.

Nurturing Young Naturalists

You told us again in 2024 that nurturing young naturalists is a top priority for you.

Thanks to you, this year we supported 286 young people through NHSN's Young Naturalist Appeal, welcomed 824 school children to Gosforth Nature Reserve and carried out 64 sessions in local schools, reaching another 490 children as part of the Gosforth's Wild Web project, supported by the National Lottery Heritage Fund.

Supporting students and early-career naturalists is important too. This year, NHSN's first Field Skills Programme was launched with the support of the John Spedan Lewis Foundation, providing valuable training to 25 early-career naturalists and nurturing their skills in wildlife identification.

Your 1829 Talks continued to provide more opportunities and new Student Naturalists joined NHSN on two long-term placements bringing new skills and a fresh perspective to our work.

Exploring Heritage


Your support is helping share the stories of local naturalists.


